

# Ministries at Christ Church

Putting our faith in action

We invite you to make this journey with us. There is so much happening at Christ Church these days. We love to welcome new people in all their various interests.

This booklet was created to provide a little background on all the ministries, groups and activities taking place at Christ Church. We hope that one, or many, of them may be a way for you to participate more fully with our church.

## Worship Supporting and participating in services

#### **Eucharistic Ministers**

Eucharistic Ministers are a group of lay ministers appointed by our rector and licensed by the Bishop to administer the Body and Blood of Christ on Sunday mornings at the 8:00 and 9:15 services, and also when needed on feast days. They serve a one-year term and may continue for a second year.

## **Choir Opportunities**

#### Chancel Choir

Make a Joyful Noise! --- And consider joining the Choir to help us turn noise into beautiful and joyful Music! The choir season extends from September through May and you are invited to sing with us as often as your schedule allows --- weekly attendance is appreciated but not required! Rehearsals are held on Wednesdays from 7:00 to 8:30 pm, and the choir sings during most Sunday and Holiday/Seasonal services. Come to sing a great variety of music from Bach to Jazz -- you and the congregation will be enriched!

#### **Bell Choir**

Talk about making a joyful noise unto the Lord! Our bell choir practices before choir rehearsals on Wednesday evenings, and leads us in worship at various services during the year.

#### Musicians

Do you play a musical instrument? You are invited to share your musical talent with the congregation! Instrumentalists and vocalists are essential to enhancing and beauty and wonder of our worship together. We especially encourage intergenerational music making, bringing together children and adults in a variety of ways. We believe beauty is found in enthusiastic participation more than musical perfection. Instrumental solos and ensembles are welcomed and encouraged during Sunday and Seasonal Services to enhance the liturgy. Let us know of your instrumental musical talent and availability!

#### Children's Choir

Children's choir sings four or five times during the year at the 9:15 Sunday Eucharist. Sometimes children sing in their own ensemble and sometimes we collaborate with the adult choir. Rehearsals are held primarily in Sunday School sessions with very occasional evening rehearsals.

In addition, our youngest members are invited up for 'Holy Chaos' on a regular basis to play percussion instruments as we sing an accessible closing song.

## Crucifers, Acolytes and Altar Servers

Torchbearers, Altar Acolytes, and Head Acolytes are crucial players in our Sunday worship. At the 8:00 service the acolyte ("one who assists in a liturgical service") carries the processional cross, reads the lessons, and assists the priest in setting the altar for communion. At the 9:15 service we have three acolyte roles for youth. Elementary aged children serve as torchbearers, lighting the way for the opening procession, the gospel, and the Eucharistic prayer. Torchbearers also collect the gifts of bread and wine from the congregation. Middle school youth serve as altar acolytes. Their responsibilities include holding the altar book for the priest, processing with the gospel book, and assisting the priest in setting the altar. High school youth serve as head acolytes. The head acolytes are responsible for making sure we have enough acolytes, lighting the altar candles, leading the procession with the cross, receiving the money offering, and shepherding younger acolytes during the service.

Training is offered for any and all who are interested in serving God and the church in this way! No experience or special knowledge necessary!

#### Altar Guild

Altar Guild members work in teams to prepare the church for services of divine worship, set the table for Communion held at each service, and clean up afterward. Each team handles this work about once a month, preparing the linens, dishes, wine, and wafers before each service. We also wash the dishes and wash and iron the linens after each service. Although this ministry requires care and attention to detail so that the worship service goes smoothly, it's a team effort, so it is always enjoyable.

#### Readers

Parishioners, known as lectors when we read, read the lessons and lead the Prayers of the People during the Sunday services. This is a wonderful way to be engaged in our church services, and we are always looking for more readers from all ages, middle-schoolers through adults.

#### Ushers

Ushers make our worship services run smoothly. They come in a little early and stay a little late. They warmly greet us, hand out bulletins, identify and assist newcomers, count attendance for communion and the Diocesan reports, and assist with communion. Ushers also are responsible for unlocking the church, trouble shooting, counting our offering, cleaning the pews, and locking up the church. Our Ushers' experience varies from 2 months to 20 years. Two ushers serve at the 8:00 and four at the 9:15 service. We add an extra usher at Christmas and Easter as our needs increase. Our ministry has 45 faithful people who serve. Ushers are scheduled about every six weeks and it varies so we get to know each other better. Ushers who are also lectors are scheduled on the same day. We welcome all interested in this ministry.

## Worship for Children

From the beginning of the 9:15 service until the Peace, ages 4 through third grade children experience Christian worship at their own level. They hear and reflect upon Bible stories, and are given time to be creative. They offer prayers and share a feast. Children meet their families in church during the Peace to receive Holy Communion.

## Children's Chapels

Ages 4 through K5 meet in the Worship Center, room 5 9:15 a.m.—The Peace

1<sup>st</sup> through 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade meet in the Children's Chapel, room 7 9:15 a.m.—The Peace

## The Nursery

The nursery provides care for infants and children through age three. The nursery is located down the stairs to the left at the church's main entrance. Professional nursery staff, supported by church volunteers, is available from 9:00 a.m. until after Christian Formation classes (11:30 am). At the Peace, parents are invited to bring their children to the nave in order for them to receive Holy Communion or a blessing.

## **Evening Prayer**

Led by lay people in the parish, the service for Evening Prayer has always been at the heart of the Episcopal/Anglican tradition. The short service begins at 5:30 on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, and lasts about 20 minutes. It is a peaceful end to the day. Worship Leaders (appointed by our rector and licensed by the Bishop) rotate through the year in leading daily Evening Prayer (Wed & Thur). Ordinarily, two persons are involved each evening, one to lead the service (officiant), and the other (lector) to read the lessons.

## Lay Pastoral Care and Eucharistic Visitors

As a trained and licensed Eucharistic Visitor you will bring not only the Blessed Sacrament of the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ to homebound parishioners, but also provide a genuine sense of caring, the gospel message, and a Christ Church presence. EVs are scheduled for visitation approximately once a month. Eucharistic Visitors may serve for up to three years.

One of the most profound gifts of being in a Christian community is having people minister to one another in times of need. Lay people can be "pastors" to one another: praying with people in the hospital, following up after the death of a loved one, or running special errands for those who are less mobile.

Eucharistic visiting is a more specialized ministry within Lay Pastoral Care. In the midst of a particular illness, or when one is bound to their home or retirement community, having a parishioner come with Holy Communion can be uniquely spiritually nourishing. The one who gives communion will also recognize these visits as holy moments. Talk with Fr. Seth Dietrich if you would like to participate as a lay pastor or would like to be trained and licensed for Eucharistic visiting.

#### Flower Guild

Members rotate through the year to arrange the altar flowers for Sunday mornings, Principal Feasts and Holy Days The group enjoys getting together for workshops and fellowship with the altar guild.

## Education Opportunities to learn and grow for all ages

#### Adult Forum

From September through May, the Adult Forum provides opportunities to hear stimulating presentations and engage in lively discussion about a wide variety of topics of interest to the adult membership of the church. These are held Sundays following the 9:15 Eucharist.

## **Bible Studies and Small Groups**

#### Sunday Evening Bible Study Group

All are welcome. Meeting from 7:00 to 8:30 pm on Sunday evenings, we use our time together to learn more about Holy Scriptures through a workbook or study book format. Units typically last from 8 to 10 weeks, so watch the church bulletins for when a new unit is about to begin, and feel free to join us.

## Men's Wednesday Morning Small Group (Bible Study)

Meeting each Wednesday, September through May, in the John Thompson Room at 7:30 am, we read and discuss the propers (lessons) for the following Sunday. Discussion is led by members of the group. After prayers, we adjourn for fellowship at a local coffee shop.

## Women's Tuesday Morning Small Group (Bible and Book Study)

The Tuesday Morning Bible & Book Study is comprised of women of all ages. Meeting from 9:15 to 10:30 a.m. in the John Thompson Room, we have lively discussions stemming from a book or Bible study that we have chosen as a group. All women are welcome to join at any time! Childcare options are available.

## Education for Ministry (EfM)

This is a rigorous program that allows students to deepen their knowledge of the Bible, participate in theological reflection, learn about church history and theology, and join with others in discovering and practicing their ministries. Students from various parishes meet weekly throughout the academic year for an evening class at a local church and share a light meal and discussion of the week's lesson.

#### Children and Youth Formation Committee

Life is a constant process of formation; forming opinions, beliefs, and practices. At Christ Church we strive to offer our children formation shaped by Scripture, the traditions of the church, imagination, and creativity. Outside of worship, children's formation occurs primarily during Children's Formation (Sunday School).

The Children's Formation Committee oversees programming for K4-8<sup>th</sup> grade children. This includes making decisions on curriculum, recruiting teachers, helping plan and organize children's formation events, and being vocal advocates of Christian formation in the lives of our young families.

## Sunday School Classes

Grades 1 through 3

10:30-11:30am

We use the 'Weaving God's Promises' curriculum to explore Scripture, our particular faith tradition, and how we encounter God in our lives.

Grades 5-8

10:30-11:30am

Our middle school formation continues the 'Weaving God's Promises' curriculum and supplements this with service activities, fun activities like the Mummer's Play, and fellowship events.

Grades 9-12

Our high school students are invited to participate in the Adult Forum. Please see 'High School Youth Fellowship' for more about high school Christian formation.

#### **Confirmation Class**

High School students who will be 16 around the date of the Bishop's fall visitation, every other year, are invited to prepare to receive the sacramental rite of Confirmation, and reflect upon being a member of the Body of Christ, the Church. Confirmation will take place again in 2014 and 2016.

## Children's Formation Teachers (K4-8<sup>th</sup> Grade)

What a wonderful gift it is nurture our children, forming their bodies, minds, and souls into disciples of Jesus Christ. We currently use the 'Weaving God's Promises' curricu-

lum. This curriculum is easily implemented and offers the opportunity for adults to learn alongside children. Lead teachers and helpers are needed in each class.

## Youth Ministry and Support Team

Our youth ministry is where the rubber hits the road, engaging young people as they begin to mature and make independent decisions about life and faith. Youth ministry is a special ministry that takes both energy and a commitment to the spiritual development of young people. Leaders help primarily by being companions, organizers, and role models for our youth.

## • Middle School Youth (Grades 6-8)

Middle School youth operates in a hybrid model. We meet as a class after the 9:15 service each week. Middle School also participates in outreach projects and occasional field trips to experience a variety of worship styles.

## • High School Youth Fellowship (Grades 9-12)

High School youth meet weekly in an action —reflection model. We act and experience God in a variety of ways, through service, prayer, worship, and fellowship. We then reflect on these experiences and work to integrate our experience of God into our lives.

## Outreach Reaching out to others in the community and the world

The Outreach Committee coordinates service opportunities for community members and organizations in need. In addition, Outreach advises the Vestry regarding spending allocations of over \$25,000 per year to those organizations. We ALWAYS welcome volunteers and have become a great "first connection" for many newcomers, because everyone knows it is fun and easy to meet people through shared service to others.

Current Outreach projects, which could always use volunteers, include:

• **The Gathering** is a community meal program which serves lunch and dinner to those in need. Christ Church serves at a Saturday noon meal 6 times a year. We also make sandwich dinner bags monthly, on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday of the month, and the meals are delivered to the lunch site for people to take home. The dinner bag project is especially kid and family friendly, because it is quick, casual, and fun.

- **World Wide Hunger Relief** is a spring opportunity to participate in a food pack for needy people in Haiti. Children as young as about 5 can participate in the assembly line, and it is fun, quick and much needed. People work in groups of 8, so you may come with a group or you may join others at their table.
- *Our Next Generation* is an after school tutoring and mentoring program at 34<sup>th</sup> and Lisbon. Tutoring is provided week nights from 5 p.m. to 6 p.m. Volunteers are always needed.
- **Shoreline Interfaith for the Elderly** provides volunteer services, primarily transportation, to help elderly people remain living at home. This is a great opportunity for someone with sporadic availability...just do it when you can!
- **The Giving Tree** is an annual Christmas season program, whereby tags with specified gifts are hung on a Christmas tree. Church members take a tag or two, and they purchase the gift on the tag. The gifts are given to the children of Our Next Generation. We need 2 people to coordinate this program for next Christmas season.
- **Clean Water for Haiti** is a Lenten program for all members of Christ Church. A daily booklet of activities and learning is prepared and distributed, and each day, there is an invitation to put some coins in a water bottle for donation to the Haiti Project. After Easter, all the money is collected and sent to Haiti, and used to provide clean water for the village of Jeannette and St. Marc's Episcopal Church in Jeannette. Interested in helping out? We need you!

## All People's Church

Since 2011, Christ Church has been building a partnership with All People's Lutheran Church, an ELCA congregation in the inner-city of Milwaukee. The Episcopal Church and the ELCA are in full communion. All People's Church is a diverse, thriving congregation with numerous ministries related to peace and justice work. As one example, they have a vibrant feeding program in which they use fresh food grown on lots across the street by youth in their congregation. Currently we help them serve a meal four times a year to the kids and adults who participate in their Wednesday Night Alive program. We go Christmas caroling with them in the neighborhood. We host them and their amazing musicians in our Sunday worship and we go there for worship as well. New opportunities for partnership are always emerging.

#### **Common Ground**

Common Ground is a group of nonpartisan, proactive, everyday citizens in Southeastern Wisconsin, dedicated to identifying pressing social problems facing our community and bringing about creative solutions. While many of Christ Church's outreach projects are

focused on a compassionate response to immediate suffering, Common Ground seeks to change deeper structures for a more just world.

## Faith and Light (Organization for People With and Without Disabilities)

Faith and Light is a community made up of persons with developmental disabilities, their families and friends, particularly young friends, who meet together on a regular basis in a Christian spirit, to share friendship, pray together, fiesta and celebrate life.

## Fellowship Spending time together as a parish family

## Feast of February Planning/Hosts

A variety of special, social gatherings planned and hosted by parish members where a fee is charged as a fundraiser to attend the event. Many events are offered throughout the month of February.

#### Newcomer's Committee

Welcome to Christ Church! Whether you are looking for a new church or have been attending with us for a while, we want you to get to know Christ Church. The Newcomer's Committee holds an inquiry class twice a year to offer information about the Episcopal Church and membership at Christ Church. We can help introduce you to other newcomers and church members, as well as guide you to ministry opportunities within our church and community.

## Men's Group

Focused on building friendships, serving the community, and spiritual growth, the Christ Church men's group meets throughout the year. This group also serves the Christ Church community, cooking for the pre-Lenten pancake brunch or barbecuing for the annual church picnic. New adventures are always being planned, and men are welcome to come to the events that catch their interest. Events include:

#### **Book Drive**

Formally run by the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, this annual event can always use help in sorting books and selling books as well as book donation after the sale.

#### Pancake Breakfast

Formally run by the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, this annual event celebrates the start of Lent. Do you love to cook pancakes? How about serve up a great breakfast or maybe you're a clean-up kind of person. Whatever your specialty, all helpers are welcome.

## Mothers of Preschoolers (MOPS)

This is a group of moms of pre-school aged children who meet 1-2 times a month to share the joys and challenges of motherhood. At our meetings you will have a chance to socialize with other moms, hear great speakers, have discussion time and participate in creative activities. While the moms are at the MOPS meeting, the MOPPETS program provides quality childcare for their children with loving and nurturing volunteers. The teachers help the children experience God's love for them through planned activities such as games, crafts, music and physical play. MOPS and MOPPETS are safe, loving environments where all have the opportunity to make new friends, share experiences and laugh together.

## Theology by the Pint

Approximately once a month, we gather for a pint of beer (or water or soda) and we discuss theological and spiritual things. Sometimes we talk about current events in light of our faith. Questions, doubts and multiple perspectives encouraged! Currently we meet at Brocach's Irish Pub on Milwaukee's East Side.

## Administration The business end of the church

## Vestry

The vestry is the governing body of the parish. It consists of the Rector, two Wardens and twelve additional vestry members. Vestry members serve a three-year term, and the vestry meets monthly to monitor and make decisions regarding church property, finances and parish life. Vestry members also serve in leadership positions as liaisons to various committees, guilds and projects. Nominated by the congregation's Nominating Committee, four members are elected to the vestry each year —to replace those retiring—at the Annual Meeting in January.

## **Diocesan Delegation**

Once a year Episcopal churches from Milwaukee to Madison to Prairie du Chien send a delegation of people to a one-day Diocesan Convention (held in different places each year). A mixture of fellowship, education, and church-business, this is an essential ministry for connecting Christ Church with the larger mission of the Episcopal Church in this area. Nominated by the church's Nominating Committee, Diocesan Delegates serve as alternates to convention in the year they run and, if elected, attend convention on behalf of the parish in the subsequent two years.

#### Finance Committee

This is a group comprised of the former and current wardens, our treasurer, a Vestry representative and three other parish members. The Committee meets monthly to monitor the budget and financial stewardship of the Church and plan the budget for approval by the Vestry.

#### **Endowment Trust Board**

The members of this Board oversee the Christ Church Endowment. The Endowment is a dedicated, long term fund that has enabled Christ Church and its members to create and enduring legacy of giving. The Endowment is invested for the long term and is managed independently of the Church's operating budget. The Board consists of eight directors appointed by the Vestry.

## Church Office Volunteers/Receptionists

There is often much to be accomplished in support of the Parish Administrator and the Staff. Can you give three hours a week (scheduled on a rotating basis so that it would not have to be every week) to answer the telephone, help prepare mailings, use the photocopier, fold, collate bulletins and newsletters, and do a variety of other office duties?

## Stewardship Committee

The Stewardship Committee, in coordinating our annual pledge campaign, looks for ways to encourage spirit-filled proportionate giving of our time, talents and money, recognizing that all that we have are gifts from God. This group begins meeting in late spring, and does the majority of our work in September and October.

#### Columbarium

The Christ Church Columbarium is located under the nave and accessed via the current Nursery. Columbarium comes from the Latin Columba or "Dovecote", the dove being the symbol of God's spirit and peace. Thus it is an area reserved for the interment of cremated remains of the deceased. It is a place for meditation and private prayer, in dignified surroundings on consecrated grounds.

Ours is under the direction of the Columbarium Trustees: Rector, current Senior & Junior Wardens, immediate past Senior Warden, and two parishioners appointed by the Vestry. Those interested in knowing more and/or purchasing a niche may contact the Rector or Parish Administrator for more information.

#### Treasurer

The treasurer has a variety of duties but generally works with the church's accounting and administrative staff to analyze and deliver monthly reports to the Finance Committee and Vestry updating on actual income and expense versus what was budgeted; collaboratively drives the annual budgeting process through historical analysis and input from committee heads, Vestry and Rector; leads ad hoc analysis and provides recommendations as issues arise that have potential financial impact to the church and assists in reporting on the church's financial information to the Diocese through the annual Parochial report.

#### Personnel Committee

The personnel committee oversees the policies and procedures for Christ Church staff. They help with recruit and hire for new positions. They assist with annual reviews, and they conduct research on best staffing practices.

## **Events**

## Special ways to come together throughout the year

## **Epiphany Dinner**

Room for many types of volunteers! Dancing, singing men in tights, a wonderful Boars Head feast, decorators to turn the Great Hall into a Great Castle – it is a wonderful, fun event to get involved in! The evening begins at 6 pm with pre-dinner Festival Music, followed by a hearty Boars Head dinner and trifle. There is a "Lord Chamberlain's Pipehorn Dance, Mummers Play, ending with Three Kings presentation. This is one you will want to sign up and be a part of the fun and fellowship!

## Fourth of July Root Beer Float Team

There is always room for another server at our now-famous root beer float giveaway during the Whitefish Bay parade. We gave away 2,500 floats at the last parade!

## Christmas Pageant

A Pageant Coordinator works with the clergy to design and implement the Christmas Pageant. Additional volunteers assist with rehearsals, provide publicity help, make or repair costumes, and help with music.

## Special Interests

## Taking care of our church and other important ministries

## **Disability Committee**

This committee is made up of people with and without disabilities who seek to make Christ Church more welcoming to people with disabilities. This committee addresses three areas, accessibility, outreach, and relational evangelism. We work to bring all people closer to Christ, regardless of physical or mental impairment.

#### **Buildings and Grounds/Handyman Projects**

This is the group who oversees the needs of our building, and gets involved in hands-on chores every so often. A number of volunteers are needed to tackle small projects such as light painting, minor electrical and other repair jobs that need to be done both inside and outside. Lots of people with a variety of skills make this committee work well. If you have two or three hours to spare here and there and a few good skills we could use your help. There are a number of small plumbing projects that need to be done inside that can be accomplished in no time at all by someone with a few good skills.

## Martha Ministry

The "Marthas" is a group who provide meals to parishioners who may be ill, just moved to the community and in need of support while organizing the house, recovering from surgery, just had a baby, are facing a crisis or other kinds of life-interrupting circumstances. Around 25 people make up the teams that rotate the response to these needs.

#### Kitchen Team

Used by many members, the kitchen serves the whole congregation and beyond, whenever food is involved! We need a Kitchen Team to keep up with the place, to make sure that we have the right supplies, and the people who use it are keeping it clean, etc. Many hands make light work.

## Cooking & Baking

There are many opportunities for fellowship at Christ Church and many times – fellowship revolves around food! Cooking and baking are essential – we need your help, make a pot a soup, bake some brownies, how about a salad? Let us know what your specialty is!

## St. Hilda's Guild

This guild's ministry provides receptions for funerals as well as helping to coordinate other *Koinonia* (fellowship-in-the-Spirit) opportunities, such as pot-luck meals, parties, recognition events, etc.

## **Archives and History**

We are currently examining historical documents and photographs, and will continue to expand ideas for preserving and passing along the history of the congregation.

#### Communications

Communication is at the heart of welcoming people into a faith community and informing people within the community. Communications includes our website, writing and editing articles for our newsletter The Messenger, and taking photos of events at and around Christ Church.

We are always on the lookout for people who are able to share their gifts in this way.

## Christ Church Pipers ("Lochs and Bagels")

Anyone interested in learning to play the bagpipes, (or anyone who already knows how) is welcome to join this group. We are recreational pipers, meaning we gather for fun and learning and not for competitions or paid performances. You are welcome to come to a practice or two and see how it works and how easy it is to learn.

## Lay Weeders and Gardening Angels

Throughout the year, four to six or more folks are needed to care for our gardens. Activities include weeding, watering, deadheading (ask and you shall be answered!) and other minor maintenance. A time commitment is asked of one or two hours per week on a weekly rotation schedule, depending upon the number of folks on the calendar. Beginning in early spring, watch for a sign-up sheet in the garden vestibule.

## Church Clean-up Days

Help keep our Church spic & span! Sometimes inside, sometimes outside – this is a great project for families to work together on. Dates to be determined based on work that is needed.

## **Living Compass Program**

Living Compass is a personal and family wellness ministry created by the Rev. Dr. Scott Stoner and his wife Holly Stoner. Living Compass Ministries provides guidance with a variety of small group formation programs that help adults, teens, parents and couples make choices that will help them connect faith and wellness in a whole new way. This program will help you name what you probably already know and help you risk taking action steps needed to make the changes you truly desire. There is a need for a group of people to oversee and lead this ministry in Christ Church. We would love to know about anyone interested in taking a leadership role, starting a small group in your home or at church, or who would like to join a group with other church members.
